Introduction

Anyone who has ever watched the television series "Dallas", has witnessed the scenario of competition. In the aftermath of Jock Ewing's death, by the provisions of his will, his sons, J. R. and Bobby, were placed in competitive positions to determine who would be most qualified to run Ewing Oil.

The consequences of their competition jeopardized both the family relationships and the financial heatth of Ewing Oil.

COMPETITION--Rivalry, the survival of the fitest to the detriment of the weaker.

I. The competitor is self centered rather than Christ centered From whence come wars and fightings among you? come they not hence, even of your own lusts that war in your members? Ye lust, and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and

Ye lust, and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war, yet ye have not, because ye ask not.

Ye ask, and receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your lusts.

B. Self exaltation is the antithesis of a Godly attitude And whosoever shall exalt himself shall be abased; and he that shall humble himself shall be exalted.

II. The competitor is carnal and not spiritual CARNAL--fleshly, pertaining to the natural desires and attitudes of men
