A Call to Humility

Scripture: Psalm 51: 16-17

Psalm 51:16-17 KJV For thou desirest not sacrifice; else would I give it: thou delightest not in burnt offering. The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit: a broken and a contrite heart, O God, thou wilt not despise.

Introduction

The worst "ism" facing our nation is neither communism nor humanism: the most damaging of all is egotism.

I. The call to humility lays aside all self efforts

Luke 18:10-13 KIV Two men went up into the temple to pray; the one a Pharisee, and the other a publican. The Pharisee stood and prayed thus with himself, God, I thank thee, that I am not as other men are, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this publican. I fast twice in the week, I give tithes of all that I possess. And the publican, standing afar off, would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast, saying, God be merciful to me a sinner.

- B. I'm religious
- C. I'm a tither

II. Pride brings us under God's discipline

<u>**1** Peter 5:5b KJV</u> ... for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble.

A. The pattern of pride

Our pride exalts us above God
Our pride makes us insensitive to God
Our pride makes us disobedient to God

B. How God deals with pride

<u>Proverbs</u> 16:18 KJV Pride goeth before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall.

III. Humility causes servanthood

<u>**1** Peter 5:6 KJV</u> Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God that he may exalt you in due time:

- A. We relinquished our rights at the Cross
- B. We have only the right to be a servant
- C. It is God's right to exalt us
