Scripture:

Philippians 3:7-8

Introduction

During the Christmas season people go scurrying about, rushing from store to store, buying presents for loved ones. I. It cost the Father his Son

John 3 :16 For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.

- A. Knowing that his Son must be abused
- B. Knowing that their fellowship would be broken
- C. Knowing that his Son must die

II. It cost the Son his glory, his honor, his life

<u>Philippians 2:7-8</u> But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made irk the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross.

- A. From a palace to a manger
- B. From being adored by angels to being spat upon by a mob and crucified between two thieves
- C. From perfect fellowship with the Father to "My God, My God, Why has thou forsaken me?"

III. It has cost men personal sacrifice, even their lives

<u>Philippians 3:7-8a</u> But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ. Yea doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord:

- A. Paul's example
- B. J. W. Tucker--martyred in Simba rebellion in the Congo
- C. Jim Elliott- martyred by Aucas in Ecuador
